## **Project Description:**

#### **Description:**

Efforts to date to tackle climate, biodiversity and inequality challenges are proving inadequate, with business-as-usual development pathways representing an existential threat to humanity and nature as we exceed planetary thresholds. In academia, policy areas (biodiversity, climate, food systems) and among social movements, attention is increasingly focused on the need for transformative change, but there is contestation, because values and viewpoints differ. This has implications for normative goals and understandings of change processes and of human-environment relations. This PhD will seek to provide contributions to theory, methodology and new empirical insights on transformative change interpretations and pathways in territories and landscapes (ideally in Colombia or Kenya).

The methodology will employ qualitative, participatory, and ethnographic research methods to engage with lived and embodied experiences and imaginaries of landscapes and territories (past, present, and future), including evolving systems of exchange, governance, and decision-making. The PhD analysis will draw upon and explore different social theories to consider how social norms and affects are embedded in and reproduce systems of power and meaning in dynamics of place and scale. Central to the analysis will be the causes and consequences of gender and intersectional inequalities relating to processes of colonialisation and neo-liberal market economies and the possibilities for, and cultivation of care, solidarity and regenerative ethics, with a focus on Indigenous Peoples and Local Communities (IPLCs) in tropical forest areas. Key research questions include: How do affects, emotions, worldviews and values shape imaginaries / understandings, experiences, and feelings relating to territories and territorial change processes and possibilities among IPLCs? To what extent are potential and ongoing change processes considered transformational and by whom? What are the pathways, levers and processes for achieving more equitable change processes?

The PhD aligns to new NRI research on Transformative Change for Biodiversity and Equity, which will involve transdisciplinary, action-research processes at global, national and landscapes scales, including engagements in a series of landscapes in Colombia, Cameroon and Kenya and partnerships with other European research organisations. The Natural Resources Institute is a multi-disciplinary institute addressing the sustainability challenges around agriculture, food systems and the environment with a focus on developing countries. Similarly, NRI's new MSc on Transformative Change for Sustainable Development and research group on Political Ecology and Culture are supporting a vibrant new research area on transformative change, political ecology, social movements, socionatures, territories, power and affect. It is envisaged that the student would have academic training in anthropology, political ecology, environmental sociology, cultural studies, gender, human geography, or psychology. This PhD scholarship will offer the student a grounding in social and biodiversity research and analytical skills, with an opportunity to work with multiple institutions at the cutting edge of research and action in this field, and a chance to engage with different disciplines.
