





Research Excellence Framework (REF) evaluation

MA and BA Social Work

- The MA aims to provide a route to social work qualification for graduates. A challenging educational experience over two years.
- Has a 70-day placement in Year 1, and a 100-day placement in Year 2. Has 30 Skills Days, 25 of which are in Year 1 – students must pass 'Readiness for Practice' before first placement which begins in January.
- The BA has 170 placement days, too a 70-day placement in Year 2 and 100day placement in Year 3. It has 30 Skills Days – students must also pass 'Readiness for Practice' (across Year 1) before they can go on to Year 2 placement.

Both programmes are in approval from the HCPC (Health and Care Professions Council).

The Professional Capabilities Framework (PCF) for Social Work



Final degree mark - undergraduate degree

• 1st: Average 70+%

All marks from second year: 20% weighting

- 2.1: Average 60-69%
- 2.2: Average 50-59%

All marks from final year: 80% weighting

• 3rd: Average 40-49%



Final degree mark - MA degree

- Distinction: Average 70+%
- Merit: Average 60-69%
- Pass: Average 50-59%



Admissions



Process

- Application
- Testing (online)
- Interview
- Offer

- GCSEs (Maths and English C or above)
- If MA, undergraduate degree (2:2 or above)
- At least a year's experience with people with social care needs
- 120 UCAS points

Scholarships and bursaries

- The High Achievement Scholarship
 - For those who gain ABB or better in A-Levels worth £2500 per year. Bursary in Years 2-3 dependant upon +60% average in preceding year of study.
- Access Scholarship (household income under £25k)
- NHS Bursary
